"COBIMET'S Distance Education Online Certification for Librarians" details the development and outcomes of a distance education certification offered in 2022 for librarians in Puerto Rico. The certification was driven by the need to equip librarians with the skills and knowledge required to effectively support learners and educators in the evolving landscape of online education, technology, and information access.

Short courses and concentrated forms of study have existed throughout the history of education. "Microaprendizaje: recorrido histórico del aprendizaje en fragmentos" notes the need for this type of learning, and recommends its continued evolution in our technology-driven and fast-paced world.

In "La integración de la inteligencia artificial en la educación," the ethical challenges of artificial intelligence in education are examined, with emphasis on the growing concerns about academic dishonesty. The article emphasizes the need to educate students about academic integrity, as well as offering recommendations on its use for educators.
